

The showiest flower to appear in July in the Dishman Hills is without doubt the delicate lavendar mariposa lily (Calochortus macrocarpus). Closely related to tulips in the Lily Family, it is found commonly in sunny places among the bunchgrass in the central part of the Hills. Besides being appreciated by people, the flowers supply nectar for bumblebees and small butterflies and the little leaf-cutter bees snip neat circles out of the petals to line the cells in which their babies develop.
